Annual Report

Chair's Report

Since I took over the GDWG Chair, six months ago, there has been considerable change among trustees and staff. I'd like to thank John Barrett for his excellent chairing over four years and for his ongoing advice to me; similarly Lynne Norman's help continues to be invaluable on staff matters. We are sorry to lose our dynamic accountant, Angie Padoan, off to Sydney in the summer; sorry too to lose Doreen Johnson, Philippe Rogueda and Iyadh Daoud from the committee. Plenty of work then for new and existing members!

In our new office Sarah is the only one to have joined since last year. There is a continuing need for flexibility as Nic and, in due course, Louise will be tying in work with a new family and Anna will be taking on an increased workload.

Volunteer visitors, of course, provide the core of our work, offering friendship to those often judged harshly by society. This can mean: bringing in much-needed clothes; pleading the cause of the people we visit; finding them helpful information or simply turning up every week and listening.

In the current bleak economic climate, after months of meticulous work by Felicity we have been immensely fortunate to gain substantial Lottery funding, assuring our continuity.

GDWG has increasingly tried to give a voice to those held now or in the past at Brook and Tinsley. We have invited their comments in focus groups and started a newsletter written by detainees. Nic and the team now hold regular surgeries in Brook House, and have encouraged detainees in the centres to act as advocates. We have tried to maximise the numbers reached by visitors, in particular speakers of other languages. For this we are very grateful to detainees who have acted as interpreters.

Volunteers and the office staff have worked with other visiting groups and anyone who will listen, to collate information and challenge practices in the detention system.

My thanks to everyone for all their work, and to the detainees of Brook and Tinsley House for their warmth and good humour to the visitors: who will come in when they are asleep after lunch; who make incomprehensible utterances, supposedly in their language; and who, champions of equality, appear once again this year to be taking a holiday in honour of an aging monarch.

I look forward to this year with GDWG, to your commitment, imagination and compassion.

Detainees' Words

Some words from those detained and those released

'I cannot stress enough how much all your hard work not only makes our lives just that little bit easier, but also the differences your group achieves. It is greatly appreciated and well admired for all the support and help you have given us. Mar sha la (God bless you all).'

'My visitor shared my pain for two years. I can never forget. He bought a card to send my children. I'm the luckiest person. He was like a father to me. We talked about much more than detention. I looked forward to his visit every Tuesday. He's part of me. My better half.'

'When I was there she visited every 10 days for 10 months. I met her family. She was very nice and helped to take my stress away. She wrote my story down for me and up to today she is still my friend.'

'The visit was very helpful. It was my first visit for a long time without a visit and it made me think in a different way. It made me start thinking afresh. In detention you think the same thoughts all the time and having a visit helps you to think of different things.'

'You put me in touch with someone from a different culture so that when I leave BH and walk down the street I see someone who looks like my visitor and right away I see that stranger as a friend. When my visitor sees someone like me on the street, they see him like a friend.'

'L came and told me everything would be okay. She is like my mum.'

'Very helpful, X my friend is the best thing that ever happen to me in ages. X and his group help me with material things, legal assistance, overcoming my depression as well as giving me confidence while I am in detention.'

Director's Report

2011 was a momentous year in GDWG's history with the group celebrating its 15th anniversary with a fantastic event in March hosted in style by Sheila Hancock. It was an honour to welcome so many people who had formerly been detained at Gatwick. Some remain with us in the UK with their cases resolved, while others are still waiting for decisions to be made on their futures. I would like to thank everyone involved in the organisation of our anniversary, from the committee of volunteers and staff who planned the event over many months, to Sheila Hancock and our Patrons Baroness Williams and Lord Dholakia, and those who served food and drinks and cleared up afterwards.

From the evening, what remains with me most is Martin's story: a young Afghan boy held in Tinsley House, visited by our volunteer Jim and then removed back to Greece. His story is a remarkable one, with an almost miraculous conclusion when he was adopted by a German lady, Ruth, who brought him back to the UK for our celebration. I vividly remember visiting him while he was in Tinsley, not long after I had started with GDWG in 2007. He was lonely and frightened and desperately needed help that at the time I could not give him. I remember phone calls with Jim, wondering how we could prevent his flight back to Greece, a decision which was based on him being assessed as an adult rather than the boy he was. Baroness Williams tried to intervene, asking the Minister at the time to defer the flight, but all was in vain. When he left I recall feeling deflated and as though I'd let him down. We don't seem to get too many happy endings in this line of work, but three years later I received an email from Ruth telling me that Martin was with her, and safe. It was a wonderful moment for me. The fact that Martin had never forgotten Jim's kindness and support, and that he wanted to get in touch with him to tell him so, tells us a lot about visiting. While it may not always feel as though we are helping, we often are but in ways that are not always immediately visible.

2011 saw some real changes for GDWG as a group, not least the move of offices to Brighton Road, but also Hannah Jackson leaving us. We miss her enthusiasm and warmth but wish her all the best for the future. Our volunteer numbers remained fairly consistent throughout the year, with around 90 visitors working with us. There were some changes to the Management Committee last year, with some long-serving trustees stepping down throughout the year. I would like to give my particular thanks to John Barrett and Doreen Johnson, both of whom have been hugely supportive of me during my time here.

There are some significant challenges on the horizon, not least the proposed Legal Aid cuts which look like they will impact greatly on detainees, but for the time being I would like to thank everyone connected to GDWG, from staff to volunteers, trustees to funders, for their continued efforts to ensure those held in detention do not become forgotten people.

Facts and Figures

In 2011 we were in contact with 983 detainees. 570 were in Brook House and 413 were in Tinsley House.

Assistance

Below are some of the measurable ways in which GDWG assisted detainees in 2011. Our services remained in high demand throughout the year, with particular increases in the number of detainees we helped with small sums of money when they were about to be removed from the UK, and in assistance to families of detainees who we provided with transport money to visit the centres.

The figures show that while our volunteers visited less detainees overall, we saw more of our clients face to face via our twice-weekly advice drop-in surgeries at Brook House. We started these in late 2010. These surgeries have allowed staff to visit those who were either there for very short periods of time or who did not necessarily want a weekly visitor but rather some ad hoc assistance.

Changes in the way legal advice is provided in all IRCs has meant that we are no longer able to make as many referrals to lawyers as previously. Legal advice is now provided through an exclusive contracting

system in which only three firms are permitted to offer Legal Aid advice and representation in each centre. One area in which we have been able to help though has been in referring detainees to public law solicitors to make Judicial Reviews on the basis of unlawful detention, which falls outside of the scope of the exclusive contracts. We were also able to refer a number of clients to the College of Law to do pro bono bail applications.


Length of Detention — a Snapshot

Below is a 'snapshot' taken on the 31st December 2011 of the length of time the detainees we were in touch with had spent in detention. What the figures show is that Brook House has a much higher number of longer-term detainees than Tinsley House. Of the 185 people we were in touch with on the 31st December 2011 48 had been detained for more than six months (26%) and 29 had been detained for over one year (16%). The longest serving detainee we are aware of is a Palestinian man who has been detained for over four years.

Countries of Origin

In 2011 we assisted detainees from 75 different countries. More Pakistanis contacted us than any other nationality, followed by Afghans and Bangladeshis. We saw a considerable number of Algerians, Zimbabweans, Eritreans, Somalis, Iranians and Iraqis, despite there being well-documented obstacles to removal to nationals of these countries. Many of these detainees were held for long periods.



Visiting — a Snapshot

Below is a 'snapshot' of the people we were visiting on 31st December, 2011. We were visiting a total of 50 detainees on that date, 18 of them for more than 3 months, including 2 who we had been visiting for more than a year.

Fifty volunteers were actively visiting on that date and another 38 were temporarily inactive meaning we had a total volunteer force of 88 people. We still find it remarkable how committed our visitors are, and how long many of them continue to do this difficult work. Of our volunteers 30 have been visiting with GDWG for over 5 years and another 19 for between 2 and 5 years.

Work with other organisations

GDWG works with many other organisations within the detention field. Our involvement with the Detention Forum continued in 2011, with our Director sitting on the Coordination Group. This work has allowed us to lobby Parliamentarians on the various detention issues that we feel require greater Parliamentary scrutiny. Included in this has been a series of meetings with MPs and Lords, as well as regular NGO meetings to discuss our strategy. This work looks set to intensify over the next few years, and GDWG are committed to being part of that.

During 2011 we submitted evidence to the Equality and Human Rights Commission, helping to push the issue of detention into one of their ten areas where public authorities can improve human rights protections in their Human Rights Review. We also submitted written evidence to the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights as part of their Universal Periodic Review, which will be focusing on the UK later in 2012, and attended a UN conference on alternatives to detention in Brussels.

On the domestic level, we continued to work closely with all of the other visitors' groups, referring clients when they were transferred around the detention estate, as well as doing joint work on operational issues, mainly under the auspices of the Asylum Rights Campaign or alongside the Association of Visitors to Immigration Detainees. We also had a series of meetings with Barnardos, investigating the possibility of expanding our visiting to cover the new family pre-departure accommodation which opened in Pease Pottage during the year. We have reached an agreement to visit anyone in Cedars who would like to be visited by at GDWG volunteer, and our fliers and posters are on display throughout the facility. Another area where we continue to work with other NGOs is around the legal advice provision to detainees under the Detention Duty Advice scheme which operates in all IRCs. Many groups, including GDWG, have concerns that the exclusive contracts awarded to a limited number of law firms to provide this advice are not providing detainees with the quality of service that they require, and that the scheme is supposed to provide. GDWG are collating evidence around this, and met with the Legal Services Commission to present our concerns.

Locally, we went out to speak to a number of schools and colleges in 2011 about our work, as well as to Church groups, the Mother's Union, a Quakers' conference and various other meetings with different groups. We believe that speaking about our experiences of visiting people in detention is important to try and break down many of the negative sentiments which often seem to be aimed at this most marginalised of groups. Labelling someone as a detainee can disguise the fact that what we are actually talking about are human beings, and we find that when we go out and talk to people about what happens to these human beings in detention it usually leads to a much more sympathetic and understanding response.

Treasurer's Report

The charity received actual grant funding in 2011 in an amount of £107,748. The release of deferred grant income of £59,927 in 2011 brought the total grant income to £167,675 as reported in the Statement of Financial Activities. £25,000 continues to be held as deferred grant income as stated in note 8 to the accounts.

We have successfully obtained funding from the Big Lottery in 2011 to the tune of £390,000 which will go towards meeting a range of our essential charitable and running costs over the next four years and we are most grateful for their support.

Total costs in 2011 remained fairly consistent with that of 2010.

The Board of Trustees are confident that with the continued invaluable support of our funders, volunteers and staff that the charity will go from strength to strength into the future.

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DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2011

The trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 December 2011. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and to comply with the charitable company's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005.

Structure, governance and management

Gatwick Detainees Welfare Group is a company limited by guarantee, registered company number 4911257, and is also a charity, registered number 1124328.

Its governing document is its Memorandum and Articles of Association and its registered address is The Orchard, 1 - 2 Gleneagles Court, Brighton Road, Crawley, West Sussex, RH10 6AD.

The former unincorporated charity of the same name; registered charity number 1053730; had its assets and liabilities transferred into the newly registered charity number 1124328, and registered company number 4911257, of the same name, on 1 April 2009. The unincorporated charity was removed from the Charity Commission register on 28 January 2011.

The trustees are appointed by the members at the AGM and they meet approximately every six weeks. The governing document allows for a member of the committe to be appointed to fill a casual vacancy. This appointment must be ratified by the members at the AGM. The maximum number of members of the executive committee is 12.

Risk management

The trustees have identified the major risks to which the charity may be exposed and have put systems in place to mitigate those risks. A review of risks is undertaken at defined periods and at least annually by the board of trustees, and actions are identified and implemented where necessary to ensure that the charity is not exposed to major strategic risks.

Public benefit

The trustees have referred to the guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives in planning its future activities. In particular, they have considered how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2011

Objectives and activities

The object of the charity is the charitable relief of immigrants and refugees who are suffering hardship, distress or who are in need, with particular reference to those who are imprisoned or detained by the UK Border Agency of the United Kingdom, whether in holding centres, prisons or police stations.

The charity has four paid employees, otherwise it is entirely staffed by volunteers. The volunteers visit detainees at Tinsley House and Brook House Immigration Removal Centres, Gatwick.

Achievements and performance

The achievements and performance of the charity are set out in the Annual Report.

Financial review

Net incoming resources for the year totalled £23,349 (2010 - net outgoing resources £26,849 [as restated]), as shown on the Statement of Financial Activities. All the assets of the charity are used to carry out its objectives.

Reserves Policy

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds, which are the free reserves of the charity, at a level which equates to between six and twelve months expenditure. The unrestricted reserves are currently low and the trustees are actively seeking grant funding to increase the reserves level in order to secure the running costs of the charity over the foreseeable future.

Statement of directors' responsibilities

The Directors are responsible for preparing the Directors' Report and the Accounts in accordance with applicable law and the United Kingdom's Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the Directors to prepare the accounts for each financial year end which gives a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Charitable Company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure of the Charitable Company for that year.

In preparing these accounts the Directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- observes the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the accounts on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the Charitable Company will continue in operation.

The Directors are responsible for keeping proper records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time, the financial position of the Charitable Company and to ensure that the accounts comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charitable Company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES

I report on the accounts of the company for the year ended 31 December 2011, which are set out on pages 4 to 9.

Respective responsibilities of directors and examiner

The directors, who also act as trustees for the charitable activities of Gatwick Detainees Welfare Group, are also responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The directors consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011, and that an Independent Examination is needed.

Having satisfied myself that the charity is not subject to an audit under company law and is eligible for independent examination, it is my responsibility to:

- (i) examine the accounts under section 145 of the 2011 Act;
- (ii) to follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 145(5) (b) of the 2011 Act; and
- (iii) to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of Independent Examiners' Report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2011

1. Accounting Policies

Basis of preparation

1.1 The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2 Incoming resources

Income is recognised as incoming resources when the charity becomes legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Grant income is deferred in accordance with the terms of the funders at the time of receipt.

1.3 Outgoing resources

Resources expended are accounted for on an accruals basis.

1.4 Charitable status and taxation

As a registered charity the company benefits from rate relief and is generally exempt from income tax and corporation tax. The charity is not registered for value added tax.

1.5 **Depreciation**

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation.

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment - 15% reducing balance

1.6 **Funds**

Unrestricted funds represent the funds of the charity that are not subject to any restrictions regarding their use and are available for application on the general purposes of the charity.

Restricted funds are funds subject to specific conditions imposed by donors and grant givers.

12 **Prior year adjustment**
